Strategic Information Choices: Success Takes Many Forms

The articles in this issue of the International Journal of Strategic Information Technology and Applications cover a variety of topics of importance to individual, organizational, and societal well-being. The issue begins with Baporikars article, *Corporate Social Responsibility for Sustainable Strategy*. Using an in-depth literature review and grounded theory approach, Baporikar analyzes *Corporate Social Responsibility* (CSR) practices. The article describes CSR practices and provides an example for banks which engage or want to engage in CSR practices.

The second article, Security: User Awareness of Security Issues and Mobile Device Management, describes a study to examine mobile security behaviors of college students. Wilkie and Mensch's study found results that might be surprising for some. In spite of a reputation for being technically savvy, college students were found not to take the measures needed to protect their personal data from hackers and thieves.

In *Impact of Excessive Access Permissions and Insider Threat Opportunity in the Financial Industry: a Qualitative Study*, Azucena conducted a qualitative, exploratory study to gain insights into the risk of insider threat in Information Systems. The study indicated the importance of access permissions to insider threat and pointed to the dangers of excessive access permissions. The article provided recommendations for access control management including regulation and policy and having a prevention mentality

The final article, *The Contribution of ICTs to Sustainable Urbanization and Health in Urban Areas in Cameroon*, an integrated and interoperable YUSIIP platform is proposed for sustainable urbanization. The article attempts to present this domestic platform and show its contribution to domestic waste, housing and sanitation management services (DWHSMS).
